# Pendleton Thinclads Invade City Friday

Coch Al Miller's Dulles track and field team, may more than have their hands full here this Friday when Pendleton's thinclads come to town.

The Buckaroos, figured this early in the season to take the Eastern Division, have two field eventers who already have established some of the best prep marks in the state thus far.

Sophomore Mike Ullman has hurled the shot 53-8, Chuck Blackley has pole vaulted 12-1½, and Ray Hughes has high jump-

yielding three hits and two Cincinnati runs in the ninth. A triple by Maury Willis, Jim Gilliam's homer, and a double by Duke Snider were the big blows of a four-run third-inning rally that won the game for the Dodgers.

The brilliant pitching of Bill Monbouquette and Camilo Pascual featured the two games in the AL.

Monbouquette allowed only four hits and three walks while striking out five Indians in a 12-inning duel with Cleveland rookie Ron Taylor. Carl Yastrzemski tripled to open the bottom of the 12th and the next two batters were purposely walked. Then Carroll Hardy broke it up with a grand slam homer — his third hit of the game.

Pascual, who pitched eight shut-outs in 1961, hurled a four-hitter and struck out seven behind a 10-hit Twin attack that included home-

ed 8-3. Other top marks by the Buckaroos, set during the Sagebrush Relays at Hermiston Friday, were Ullman, javelin, 179-10; Jim Fraa, javelin, 143; Fraa, shot-put, 46-0; Blackley, pole vault, 12-1½; Dale Langkilde, pole vault, 11-1; Fraa, discus, 131-¾; Blackley, discus, 115-5¼; Ray Hughes, high jump, 5-10¾; Bob Thorne, broad jump, 18-7¾; Bob DeWitt, Jim Denton, Steve Smith, Walker, mile relay, 3:22.9.

In other events, during the Carnival of Speed at Milton-Freewater two weeks ago, Dave Walker ran the 100-yard dash in 10.5—and finished fifth. He also ran the 400 in 53.3, a second. Curtis Thorne ran the 120-yard lows in 14.0, taking a second; and Hughes, setting a meet record, high jumped 0-3. In that same meet, Fraa bettered his Sagebrush mark, hurling the discus 136-6.

Marks like these could tend to start a rash of cold feet, but they needn't. A gusty, 60-mile-an-hour wind ripped across the Hermiston lawns that day, and some of the throwing marks could have been helped. On the other hand, if the Bucks are as strong as they seem to be, the winds could have hindered some of the efforts just as well.

The meet Friday, which will pit both varsity and jayvee thin-
