# Buckaroos Roll Over Indians Here, 96-37

The visiting Buckaroos of Pendleton, already figured in the state's eastern track circles to pick up most of the District 7 A-1 Eastern Division marbles, left no doubt in the minds of Dalles thinclads that the Bucks, along with Bend, will be the team to beat when the sub-district and district track meets are held here in mid-May.

Pendleton, sparked by the hurdles running of Curt and Dave Thorne, in the sprints by Dave Walker and the field events by Ray Hughes, Charles Blackley and Jim Frala, bundled up 70 points in firsts and went on to win over The Dalles, 96-37.

The hosting Indians, during one of the best track days of the season so far as the weather is concerned, gained one first place. John Merriss won the 880-yard run in 2:07.1. He had to come from behind to do it, however, as Hall of the visitors took the lead for the most of a lap. He was clocked at 2:07.6.

One event was added to normal 14—the mile relay. Pendleton won that one in 3:43.0. Names of winning relayers were unavailable. Gary Miller, Roger Obrist, John Pereira and Joe Petroff ran it for The Dalles in 3:53.8.

Scoring was based on the 5-3-1 basis, five team points to the winner of each event, three for second and one for third. The Indians host Goldendale Monday in a 4 p. m. encounter.
