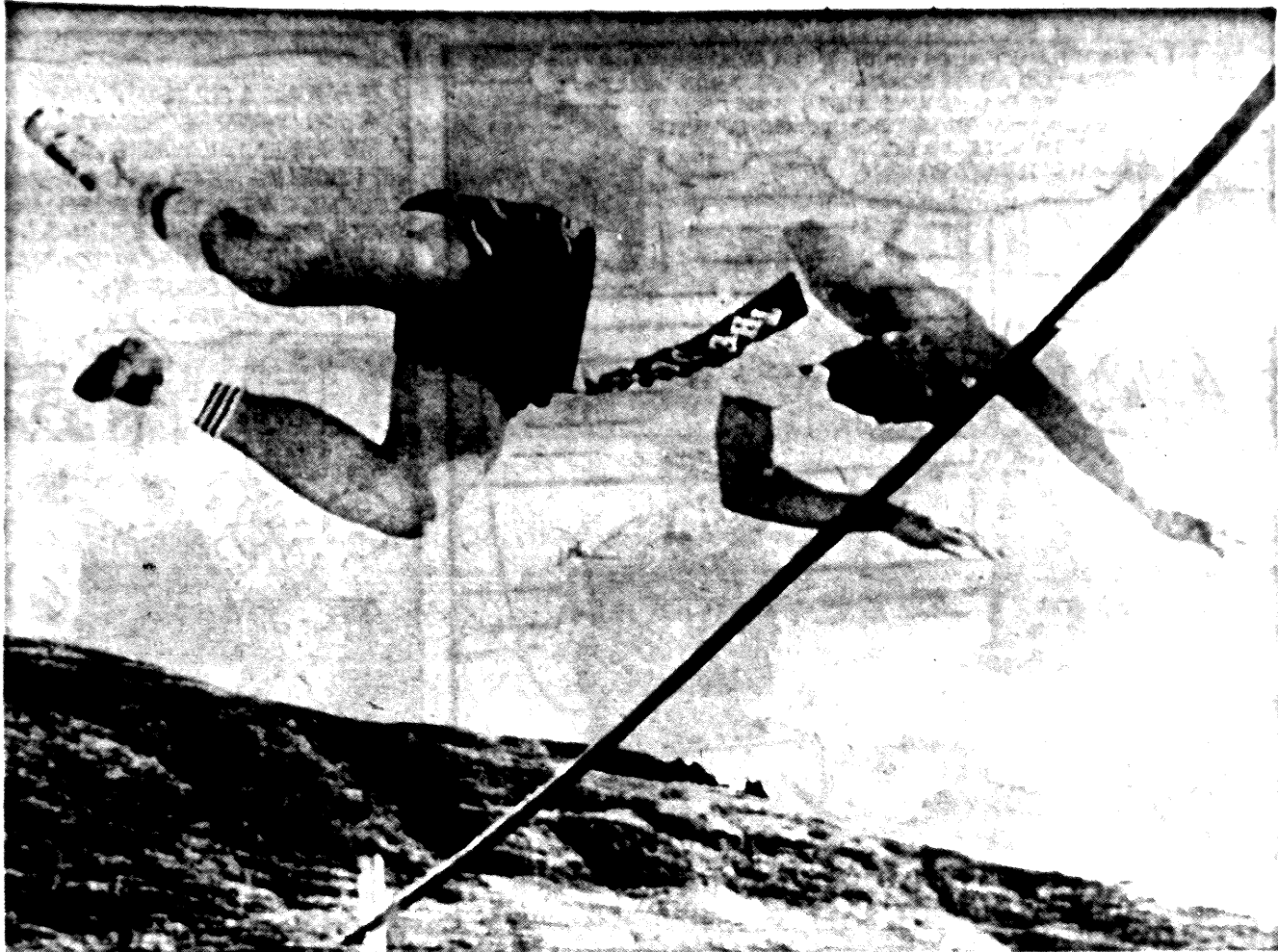

# Indians Win Dual Meet Here, 86-36

The Dalles Indians won a dual track meet over visiting Golden-dale Monday, 86-36.

"But the win wasn't the important thing today," said track mentor Al Miller after the meet. "Each time these guys have gone to the track they've shown a little more improvement."

This particularly was shown in the field events. Ken Bailey, for instance, put the shot 46-2 $\frac{3}{4}$ , better than four inches more than his throw against Pendleton here Friday.

And Dennis Anghilante, who doubles in the 880-relay, cracked the 150-foot barrier Monday with the javelin, hurling the spear 151-1 $\frac{1}{2}$ . He placed third in the Pendleton meet with a 147-8. Randy Martin, who yesterday took a turn on the high hurdles, threw the javelin 148-3, his best effort of the season.

Over at the high bar, Bill Gustafson, who's been turning out the last week or so, pole vaulted 10-0 and cleared the bar easily. Miller says he hopes Gustafson will approach 12 feet in a few weeks.

John Pereira duplicated his 56.6 time in the 440-yard dash, breaking the yarn just a shade ahead of Tom Webb at 56.8.

In the mile run, Harry Skandara chopped some time off his 4:53.8 against Pendleton. Monday he was clocked around in 4:44.0.

Friday, the thinclads go to Walla Walla for the Wa-Hi Relays, an invitational in which eight schools, four each from Washington and Oregon, will compete. Pendleton, Hermiston and Milton-Freewater will join The Dalles as the Oregon contingent, while Pasco, Richland and Kennewick join Walla Walla to represent the Evergreen State. It's an evening meet.
