The Dalles entered but 10, and only eight of those competed, which probably was the case with several of the schools.

Bend, with a bus load entered, won the Class A-1 division; and Pendleton, also with a heavy contingent, took a respectable third. The Dalles was the only other IML team that scored in the A-1 division. The firsts won by IML teams included the broad jump relay, Pendleton: two mile relay, Bend; distance medley, Pendleton; shuttle relays. Bend: and mile relay. Bend.
