the distance medley, and the sprint medley and a third in the 890 yard relay.

Other Indian places were Gary Ordway second in the broad jump and the low hurdles and a fourth in the high hurdles. Austin gained mile and Joe Thompson was fourth in the 440. Another freshman, Luther Goin, took third in the broad jump.
