Patera Hits 60-4 In Shot

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem (Special) — College records took a tremendous beating at the 15th annual Willamette Relays Saturday, a bevy of field event artists stealing the thunder away from the three prestige invitational events:

Fourteen marks fell and one was tied.

Ken Patera used a massive pair of shoulders to smash every shotput record in sight with a 60-foot four-inch toss, the effort adding more than four feet to his own mark set last year.

Patera, wearing the Winged-M of Multnomah Athletic Club but competing unattached, also gained stature as the first shotputter ever to pass the 60-foot mark in McCulloch Stadium.

The 60-footer came on his second try, following an opening 59-7.

Al Pemberton and Wariboko West of Washington extended the field event surge with new meet standards in the discus and broad jump, respectively; Oregon Frosh standout John Pahlke did the same in the novice javelin; and Chris Bollen of Washington and Jim Rommel of Portland State capped the day with new top efforts in the senior and novice pole vaults.

Pemberton whirled the discus 172-6 $\frac{3}{4}$, almost 20 feet better than the senior record; West broad jumped 24-2 and teammate Phil Shinnick went 24- $\frac{1}{2}$, bettering the 23-4 $\frac{3}{4}$ of 1956; Pahlke rocketed the javelin 222-2, adding six feet to that standard, and Bollen and Rommel each went over 14- $\frac{1}{2}$ in the vault to tack on seven and four inches on their predecessors.

Meet marks also fell in the college and frosh division distance medleys, the frosh shuttle-hurdles, the university

Tretten Sets Javelin Mark

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem (Special) — Blessed by ideal weather conditions, high school athletes started disappointingly, but finished brilliantly in Saturday's sun-bathed Willamette Relays as four records tumbled.

Boyer Denies Assault Rap

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — A second New York Yankee, third baseman Cletus Boyer, was charged Saturday with assault and battery in the barroom beating of a male model.

The model, Jerome Modzelewski, 25, swore out the warrant after a bartender said he saw Boyer throw at least one punch.

Modzelewski said two men beat him up early Thursday morning. He identified Roger Maris as one of them and signed a warrant Thursday night charging him with assault and battery.

Police reports said Boyer denied being involved in the fight. Maris said he was merely trying to break it up.

The warrant will be served when the Yankees return from Puerto Rico where they are playing this weekend.

Modzelewski said he took exception to obscenities directed at him as he and a

New standards were established in the distance medley, javelin, high jump and pole vault.

Laurels for the outstanding prep performance would have to go to Clatskanie's Ole Tretten who shattered the javelin mark by more than 10 feet. Tretten tossed the spear 210 feet, 6 inches, bettering the 200-1 distance set by Walter Smith of Klamath Falls last year.

Columbia River of Vancouver broke the distance medley mark as up-and-coming miler Roscoe Divine ran a 4:28 anchor mile. Although Divine said he was "tired and just wasn't fast today," it was his final four-laps which boosted the team to a 10 minute, 42.6 second time. The clocking was nearly 7 seconds faster than the 1960 mark of 10:49.4 by South Salem.

2 Vault Marks Fall

Mark Henry, Larry Hines and Tim Ramberg ran $\frac{3}{4}$ miles, 440 yards and 880, respectively, in front of Divine or the record jaunt.

Two marks were actually set in the pole vault—in the senior and novice divisions. Art Phelps of Colton, winning on fewer misses, vaulted 12-1, erasing the old mark of 12- $\frac{1}{2}$, set by Tigard's John Turman in '64. North Salem's Greg

Hoffman's performance was hindered by the exit of Archie San Romani, who was unable to compete because of a sore leg, and the high jump was tarnished by the absence of Paul Stuber, ex-Oregon flash.

Washington, teamwise, was easily the class of the field. The Huskies picked off six individual titles and three relay crowns, sweeping the broad jump in the process.
