Thompson Wins St

Officials Make Big Meet Go

The track and field buffs couldn't have asked for a better break weather-wise Saturday as a warm sun put the temperature in the 60s for the meet.

And as usual some 1,450 colorful clad spikers ran, jumped and tossed as a nearly filled McCulloch Stadium gallery urged them on.

But the real heroes of the big meet surely are the officials. It takes 80 or so to keep things running in apple-pie order and

we can't start to list them all, but after meet director Chuck Bowles comes such important ones as referee Herb Johnsrud and clerks of the course John Dalke, Fabian Nelson, Bob Donovan, Mo Fitzsimons, Hank Er-

The press box crew, headed by Bob Woodle, compiles the results and tries to keep radio, television, press and coaches happy.

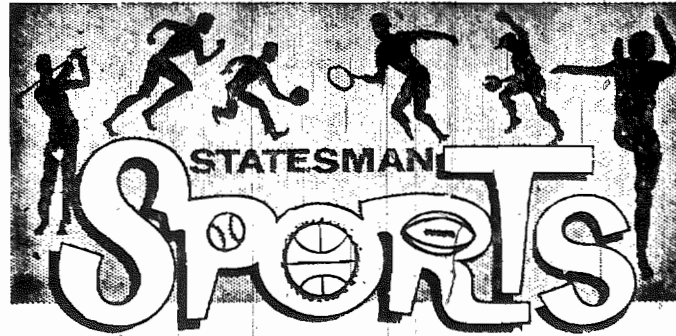
Then of course there's the athletes, who without there just wouldn't be a gathering.

Records fell as usual Saturday and it was the athletes that accounted for this. Some 10 in all.

The three feature races were good, although the Statesman Mile lacked the glitter a Burleson, Grelle, etc., can give it. Nevertheless Terry Thompson, who can claim the honor of being the first Salem boy to put his name on the winners' list, ran a fine race to win in 4:09.1.

Statesman Mile in Relays

Lee, Turner Capture Other Feature Events

Terry Thompson, running for the Staters Track Club, got the 17th annual Willamette Relays off and running Saturday at McCulloch Stadium as he won the Statesman Invitational Mile in 4:09.2, the third best clocking ever in this glitter event.

And to keep things rolling along in good order John Lee of Whitworth won his second straight Vern Gilmore Invitational High Hurdles in 14.5, a bit slower than his record time of 14.3 which he turned in last year.

Then in the third and final feature race of the day Willie Turner of the Oregon State Rooks thrilled the big crowd with a fine 9.6 to take the Oliver Huston Invitational 100-yard Dash.

But the feature events were just a small share of the overall color and thrills as some 1,450 athletes from 40 high schools, 23 colleges, and three track clubs paraded in colorful review. All told some 48 events were run off in four hours of track and field action.

Some 10 records fell as the weather cooperated with the athletes. Three tumbled in the high school division, while seven were topped in college and university action.

The Statesman mile was the first event on the list. Thompson, a transfer student from the University of Missouri and ineligible until next year to compete for Oregon State, took the lead from the start and was never pushed. His time has only been bettered by Dyrrol Burleson's 3:57.5 of last year and the 4:08.1 by Norm Hoffman in 1964.

Thompson, who did his prepping at South Salem High, paced the first quarter in 63 seconds. He was 2:07 at the half and then turned on the steam to breeze the third 440 in 59 seconds. His last lap was a 63.2 with nobody to push him.

Loren McKnight of Whitworth was second in 4:13.2, while Jack Tighe, another Whitworth runner, was third in 4:16.9. Ex-Portland University miler Pat Becker, now running for the DePaul Track Club, was fourth in 4:21.3.

For Thompson, who in his own words is really an 880 man, it was his first mile of the season and was only two-tenths of a second off his own all-time best. He ran one mile indoors at Los Angeles in 4:09. When he received the big trophy from Statesman publisher Charles E. Sprague he remarked it was the first trophy he had ever won.

Thompson felt he could have turned the half mile in under 1:48 Saturday and feels he'll do 1:47 before the year is over.

It was just another win for Lee in the Gilmore Hurdles as he won in what he called a

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Weill Sets Disc Mark At Hayward

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Former Stanford star Dave Weill threw the discus 195 feet, 3 inches Saturday in an open meet at the University of Oregon, setting a new Hayward Field record.

Weill, competing for the Athens Athletic Club in the non-scoring meet, defeated Neal Steinhauer of Oregon, who threw 187-3. Weill's toss erased the mark of 191-4 set by Al Oerter when he competed for the New York Athletic Club in 1960.

Steinhauer, who missed workouts this week after having a tooth pulled Tuesday, won the shotput at 66-5½, far below his best of 68-11¼.

Oregon athletes won 10 of the 18 events. Also competing were the Santa Clara Youth Village, Oregon Track Club and Multnomah Athletic Club.

Bob Blum of Oregon won a wind-aided hurdles race in 13.9. Oregon freshman Frank Marlatt of Toronto, Ont., won the 220 in 22.1, with Mike Deibele of Oregon and Del Martin, Santa Clara, getting the same time. Deibele was given second.

Jim Grelle of the Multnomah Athletic Club was a late entry in the two-mile, and won it easily in 8:56.2.

Tom Smith, another Oregon freshman, upset Darrell Horn of the Athens club with a 24-6¼ mark in the long jump.

Roscoe Divine and Arnie Kvalheim of Oregon ran the mile in a dead heat in 4:05.9.

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP)—Dave Stockton shot 10 threes in a third round 65 Saturday to tie George Archer for the lead at 199 in the \$125,000 Greater Greensboro Open Golf Tournament.

Archer, the 36-hole leader, shot 68 in a head-to-head battle with his fellow Californian that ended with each 14-under-par and two strokes under the old GGO record for the three-quarter mark.

A Greensboro record gallery of about 20,000 swarmed over the Sedgefield Country Club course in 84-degree temperature to see the two West Coast youngsters steal the play from their more celebrated rivals.

Going into Sunday's final 18 holes and the battle for \$25,000 top money they were six strokes ahead of their nearest rivals—Arnold Palmer, Doug Sanders and Johnny Pott.

Stockton began the day three shots back of Archer and had to catch him three times before making it stick at the 16th hole. Stockton shot the 36-35 course, 7,000 yards, in 33-32 and Archer made it in 34-34.

Stockton drew even at the par three 16th where Archer was trapped and took a bogey and Stockton got his par.

Each birdied the par four 17th and remained even with par fours on 18.

Stockton, who says he changed his golfing philosophy to "play more forcefully, trying to pick up more birdies," had

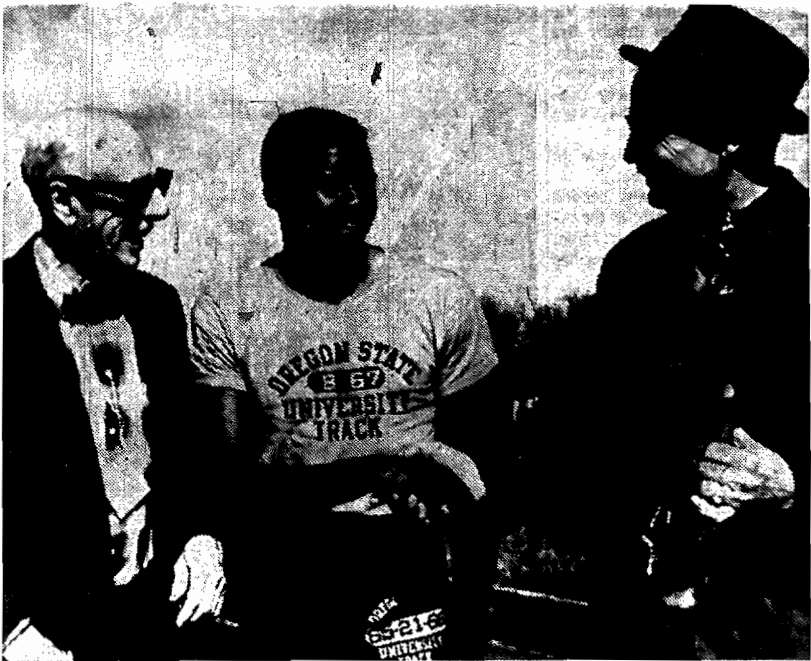
short game bailed him out and he parred each hole.

was going to fire his recall gun, and still won by three yards in 9.6, just a tenth off the record set last year by Jim Kjolso of Central Washington. The time equalled the mark held for years by the great Harry Jerome of Oregon, a Canadian Olympian.

The century field was a good one, with Larry Scherer of

Clark College coming in second in 9.7, the same time given to third place Bob Perry of Whitman. Rod Paul of the Oregon State Rooks took fourth in 9.8, while a 10 flat by Roger Beebe of Whitworth was only good enough for fifth. Dal Hammer of Central Oregon College was sixth in 10.1.

The great Dyrol Burleson

pulled the crowd to its feet as he anchored the Portland Track Club to victory in the Open Distance Medley Relay. Burleson, trailing by a yard or two in his mile anchor as the last lay starter, turned on the speed and sprinted the final 440 in about 54 seconds to win going away. Time for the two and one-half miles event was 10:12.7.

Oregon State had a hand in five of the new records, with the Rooks collaring three of them.

The OSU varsity 440 Relay team of Steve Davis, Greg Marks, Bob Mayes and Steve Pancoast turned the oval in 41.5, snapping the mark of 43.2 set by Washington in 1965.

The Rooks snapped the two-mile relay mark of 8:07.4 as Jim Palmeteer, Ed Miller, Greg Hall and John Lilly combined for a 7:48.6 clocking. The old mark was set in 1961 by the Oregon Frosh.

Again in the mile relay Rooks snapped the old record as Hall, Miller and Lilly got help from Rod Paul to win in 3:22.1. The old mark of 3:24.3 was also an Oregon Frosh best set in 1962.

John Radetich of the Rooks had his jumping legs with him as he set a new novice high jump mark of 6-9 3/4, which also tied the stadium record. The old novice mark was 6-4 1/2 set by Bill Larson of the Ducklings in 1964.

Oregon State's Bob Glaeser went 15-2 in the pole vault to surpass the old standard of 14-11 set last year by another OSU ace, John Hergenrath.

In high school action North Salem, Hillsboro and tiny Crow shared honors with four wins each. North Salem got victory in the high hurdles by Brad Victor, in the distance medley, in the novice shot by Mark Highberger and the novice high jump by Victor.

Other local high schools winning events included Salem Academy with three, Central Colton and South Salem with two each, and Albany, Chemawa, Serra, Lebanon and McNary with one each.

Crow gave the fans the biggest thrill as Wayne Day, the state B mile and cross country champ, ran a great 880 anchor lap in the two-mile relay after starting some 70 yards behind. Day also anchored a winning distance medley quartet. Other Crow wins were in the 440 relay and mile relay. Day again paced the win in the latter event.

One of the high school marks to fall came in the two-mile relay when Hillsboro won its heat in 8:08.7, snapping the old standard of 8:19.7 set by South Salem in 1962.

Colton got one of the new marks when Craig Phelps tossed the discus 140.3 in the novice division to shatter the 1962 record of 139.8 set by John McKern of Central Linn.

The final prep mark went to Centennial in the mile relay with a clocking of 3:25.8. The old record, set by Hudson's Bay in 1966, was 3:31.0.

Andretti Captures Fast Sebring Run

SEBRING, Fla. (AP)—Mario Andretti rocketed home with a 60-mile lead and won Sebring's fastest 12-hour sports car endurance race Saturday night, moving Ford into the lead in defense of its world sports car title.

Ford had a 1-2 victory parade in the making until, with just 23 minutes to go, a Mark II driven by former Indianapolis Champion A. J. Foyt went into its pit with a frozen engine.

Foyt had a 25-minute lead over a third-place Porsche when disaster befell him and a rhubarb over whether his lead would stand up for second place.

Frantic efforts by his crew to revive the car failed and some officials thought that he could not preserve his second place

standing unless he got back onto the track under his car's own power.

Driving a bright yellow Mark IV prototype, Andretti easily shattered Sebring's speed record, coming home two laps in front of the second Ford factory entry and 11 laps ahead of a German Porsche, driven by Gerhard Mitter and Scooter Patrick.

Ferrari, which surrendered the world title to Ford last year, decided to sit out this race after clobbering the Detroit giant at Daytona Beach in February in the first of the 1967 series of races.

Ford picked up nine points for first place and now goes into the biggest race of them all—the 24 hours of Lemans, France—with a total of 12.

The Italian Ferrari factory collected nine points at Daytona and in holding its first team out of the Sebring race failed to add to its total. No privately entered Ferrari figured in the competition at Sebring.

ride in track, to Oregon State, where he now pays his own way. His reason—he owns and operates a 40-foot fishing boat out of Newport in the summer and going back to Missouri would cut into his fishing time. The young runner, a graduate of South Salem, makes pretty good money catching salmon and tuna.

The Oliver Huston dash winner is also an Oregon State student and a transfer from Yakima JC where he was considered the next best thing to milk. San Jose figured it had Willie Turner all locked up when it came time to transfer, but Oregon State made a better pitch and the fleet youngster is now performing in Orange and Black.

John Lee of Whitworth seems to have a stranglehold on the Vern Gilmore hurdles as he won for the second time and is just a junior, which means we'll probably see him again. His time of 14.5 was considered pretty bad by the runner himself, but then he was certain he hit at least 10 hurdles on his way to the finish line.

And the high school kids, while setting just three of the 10 records Saturday, are something to watch. There's a race for every size school and kid and some of the runners looked much too young to be in high school.

Just one race was missing—the 100-yard roll, which Ted Ogdahl and this writer have trained faithfully for all winter. Next year it'll be on the program, since it's an olympic year, and the winner gets a trip to Mexico.
